Logan students asked questions about college and options after high school that demonstrated that they understand that whatever path they choose to follow, simply graduating from high school will not be enough to make their dreams come true.

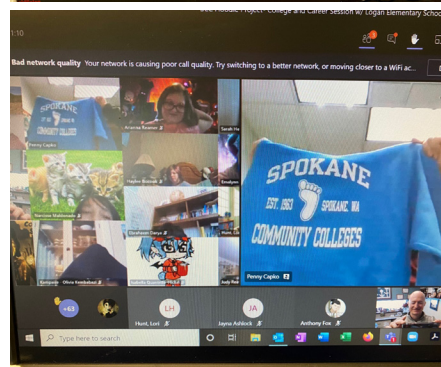
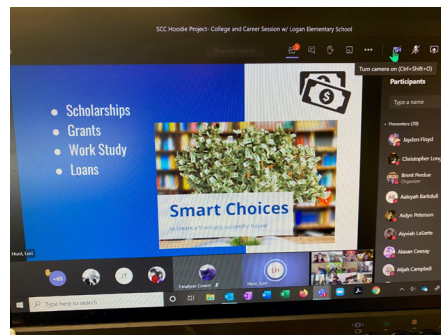

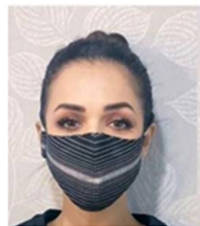

What will the levy cost?

The 2021 levy replaces the expiring 2018 levy and is not a new tax. The total estimated tax rate for schools will be less than in 2018 and prior years.

Estimated tax rates (per \$1,000 of assessed valuation) are:

- 2022: \$2.40
- 2023: \$2.45
- 2024: \$2.50

Daily Health Checks Required



All students attending school in person must have a daily health check completed each morning. Parents are encouraged to complete the health check before the child leaves home. This helps create a routine, and also gives time for the health check to be registered in the SPS reporting system.

The easiest way to complete the health check is through the Spokane Public Schools app, which is available on Google Play and the Apple App Store.
