Principal's Corner

Good day to each of you,

On February 9th, a replacement levy for Spokane Public Schools will be on the ballot. One of the questions that I have been asked is why the school district needs this money during a pandemic while we are building a number of brand new schools?

The answer to this great question is fairly straight forward. When voters pass a bond measure, those dollars can only be used for buildings. The school district may not use a penny of that money to fund other things. So even in the middle of a pandemic, the money slated for building, cannot be diverted to other needs.

Levies, on the other hand, are for learning and are used to provide staffing positions (like nurses, counselors, custodians), extra-curricular programs, and learning supports that the state does not pay for. To provide one example, the state funds 5 nurses to support 29,000 students. That's one nurse per 5,800 students. Or to dive a little deeper, if elementary schools were to average 500 students each, a nurse would have to cover 12 different schools without levy dollars.

So, when a family member, friend or neighbor asks you about why the district is running a levy at the same time brand new schools are built, you can share that **bonds are for buildings, levies are for learning!**

Logan is in need of substitutes to serve as morning and afternoon crossing patrol guards, as well as substitutes for the lunchroom and playground during the noon hour when regular employees are away. Most regular employees get hired on after first starting as a substitute, and rarely do they have to work very long before being hired on a more permanent basis. The wage for these positions is \$13.69 per hour. And while a background and fingerprint check is required for employment with Spokane Public Schools, Logan will pay the associated fees for anyone after 10 hours of service. # Not getting notifications from school?



With school closed last week, some parents may have found that they did not receive recorded voicemails or text messages

regarding the closure from the school district or from Logan directly. There are two steps you can take to determine why you are not receiving information.

First, make sure that the school has current phone numbers for you and any emergency contacts. Call Logan at 354.3434 to see if your contact information is accurate.

Next, it is possible that at some point in the past, you took steps to block calls or texts from the school or school district. It is important to note that if you block calls/texts for one school or for the district, it blocks communication from all schools and the district.

Opting back in is easy:

Text (SMS) Messages: Send a text to 60680 with the word "START" from the phone line that opted out.

Phone Calls: Call the Blackboard Phone Hotline at 855.502.7867 from the phone line that has opted out.

#### What will the levy cost?

The 2021 levy replaces the expiring 2018 levy and is not a new tax. The total estimated tax rate for schools will be less than in 2018 and prior years.

Estimated tax rates (per \$1,000 of assessed valuation) are:

- 2022: \$2.40
- 2023: \$2.45
- 2024: \$2.50
