Principal's Corner

Greetings Lion Families,

Your Logan staff has been on an equity journey since we first added equity as a focus area in the 2017-2018 school year. This work has seen us explore issues of race, culture and the negative impacts of disciplinary practices that across the nation impact black and brown children disproportionately and leads to what has been termed the school-to-prison pipeline. With roughly 50% of Logan scholars identifying as students of color, it has been an important point of emphasis for our staff, who is almost exclusively white. Past years have seen us work with Sandy Williams, editor of the local Black Lens newspaper, and trainers from the Washington Education Association to help us further our understanding of racial justice and our role as white educators in advancing the conversations about race in America and how implicit bias places barriers in the path of our students' success.

You may or may not know that this past summer, the Spokane School Board passed an equity resolution to help the district prioritize this work. The resolution can be viewed here: https://bit.ly/3krmIiL. I feel your Logan Staff have embraced this work already and are excited to see this becoming a district area of focus. And whether you are a person of color or not, it is my sincerest hope that when you walk in to our school, you feel the impact of this work by the warmth, acceptance and support that our Logan staff work so hard to convey.

I encourage each of you to look for a story later in this issue titled "Parent Listening Sessions for Racial Equity" and plan to tune in. The children we share are growing up in a world that is increasingly diverse and global. We can support their future success by helping them strive for greatness, embrace their true selves and work to be actively anti-racist.

All students attending school in person must have a daily health check completed each morning. Parents are encouraged to complete the health check before the child leaves home. This helps create a routine, and also gives time for the health check to be registered in the SPS reporting system.

The easiest way to complete the health check is through the Spokane Public Schools app, which is available on Google Play and the Apple App Store.


These sessions will be held monthly via Zoom until further notice. Stay tuned for more information from SPS on how to access the Zoom sessions.
