Principal's Corner

Good day to all Jefferson Families and Community Members,

Last week, I dove into the history behind Black History Month and how it came to be the month of February in The United States.

This week, I wanted to push our thinking a little and branch out from what has traditionally been the focus of the month. Often, schools and communities focus their attention on just four or five influential black Americans in history, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Fredrick Douglass, Harriet Tubman and Rosa Parks, with a little Ruby Bridges thrown in at the elementary level. It is important to help our young scholars learn of many more influential contributors to the long and rich history of African-Americans in America.

Renee Graham, in her essay
"How – and how not- to celebrate
Black History Month" pushes
us to" learn about history's
hidden figures, especially Black
women. Dr. Patricia Bath was an
ophthalmologist who invented the
Laserphaco Probe for cataract
treatment; in 1986, she became the



first Black woman doctor to receive a medical patent... <u>Pauli Murray</u>, a feminist and civil rights icon, deeply influenced King. In 1971, Murray even wrote a <u>letter to President Nixon</u> asking to be considered as a replacement for retiring justice Hugo Black."

Graham goes on to say that "Black people stand not apart from but in the center of American history. Every American who honors Black achievement and accomplishment honors their nation. Dig deeper. Read more. Listen and learn from those who know. Appreciate the sacrifices, innovation, and unrequited love that Black people have given this nation."

Let's follow Graham's encouragement and keep digging in!

<u>Biggest Needs:</u> Keurig K-cups, juice boxes and individual serving beverages, fresh fruit and vegetables, eggs, shredded cheese, frozen meals (breakfast sandwiches, snacks, pastas, pizza, etc), garbage bags (tall kitchen with drawstrings), paper towel rolls, 55 gallon trash bags, antibacterial liquid hand soap refills, activities and games for teenagers, baby wipes, teen/adult coloring books and colored pencils.
