PRINCIPAL'S CORNER

Greetings to you all,

Our Mindset journey continues this week as we dig into the work of Jo Boaler, whose book, Mathematical Mindsets, explores how the concept of mindset impacts a scholar's approach to mathematics.

Study after study has shown that the brain is a truly amazing organ, capable of rapid growth and change in a short amount of

time. If something is learned at a deep level, lasting connections are formed, but if learning is just touched on or done in a "superficial way, the synaptic connections can 'wash away' like pathways made in the sand."

Interestingly, there is a pervasive belief in the United States that there are those who are born to do math, and others who are not. But this is simply not true. Recent brain research has shown that "everyone, with the right teaching and messages, can be successful in math, and everyone can achieve at the highest levels in school. A lot of scientific evidence suggests that the difference between those who succeed and those who don't is not the brains they were born with, but their approach to life, the messages they receive about their potential, and the opportunities they have to learn."

Here at Jefferson, we are embracing these tenets, and ask that you do so as well at home. All of our kids can learn mathematics at high levels. Please join me in our journey to make it so!

Check back next week when I will be sharing some findings that it is high achievers who are often most affected by having fixed mindsets, rather than embracing a growth mindset.

The 10 minutes right before and after school can be quite a challenge. Busy and congested may be inconvenient, but it doesn't have to be unsafe. Please do your part to keep our students, staff, and other parents out of harm's way.

- Park and walk. Avoid the chaos! Park down the block and walk with your student. It's safer and healthier. If you park across the street, take the time to walk with your young student(s), and show them how to use the crosswalk correctly.
- Park only in designated areas. Parking inappropriately or in a No Parking zone puts students and other drivers at risk.
- Watch for and follow crossing guard instructions. Help them keep our students safe!
- Use curbside arrival/departure: Have your student(s) exit the vehicle at the curb, not into or across traffic.
- Slow down! We get it. It's been a hectic day. But the school zone is where you need to slow down and practice patience.

Please do NOT:

- Park in bus areas. While this may seem convenient, it creates all kinds of student safety issues.
- Drive in the wrong direction or make U-turns. Besides being illegal, these actions put students and other drivers in danger.
- Block crosswalks, sidewalks, or driveways. This forces students and others to walk around your vehicle into traffic. It also makes neighbors mad.
- Use your phone. Distracted driving puts everyone in danger.
- Back up in school zones. This can be extremely dangerous in areas with many younger students.


