Principal's Corner

Greetings,

This week, as we continue the <u>Mathematical Mindsets</u> journey we began two weeks ago, I want to touch on some hard numbers that indicate that not only is possessing a Growth Mindset a great thing for a student's overall outlook on learning, it can pay off in terms of academic achievement.



Let's begin by looking at some

international comparisons. A representative sample of students from across the globe take the Program for International Student Assessment (PISA) every three years. Recently, the assessment began to assess a student's mindset in addition to the academic subjects included. An interesting discovery was uncovered. The highest achieving students in the world were those with a growth mindset, outranking those with a fixed mindset (students who hold a belief that you are either smart or you are not) by as much or more than a year of mathematics achievement.

What's more astonishing, is that it was not the lower achieving students who are impacted the most by mindset, but high achieving girls. Jo Boaler states:

It turns out that even believing you are smart- one of the fixed mindset messages- is damaging, as students with this fixed mindset are less willing to try more challenging work or subjects because they are (subconsciously) afraid of slipping up and no longer being seen as smart. Students with a growth mindset take on hard work, and they view mistakes as a challenge and motivation to do more. (Boaler 7)

Check back next week when we will explore one of the reasons fixed mindsets are so prevalent in the United States, and not so much in higher achieving countries.

Emergency Procedures (page 10)

Jefferson has a well-developed plan in place in case of an emergency. The plan includes preparations for evacuating the school or locking it down depending on the situation. In concert with local emergency responders, Jefferson's Crisis Plan utilizes Rapid Responder technology which pro-



vides detailed information about the school to officials who would respond to Jefferson in case of an emergency.

In addition to the plan, the school conducts evacuation (fire) drills, lockdown crisis drills and shelter in place drills throughout the school year in order to be prepared in case an emergency were to present itself.
