Greetings Jefferson Community,

In your hands is the last edition of The Jefferson Journal for the 2022-2023 school year. I wish to thank you for partnering with us in support of our shared young scholars. We have so many children of promise who deserve everything the world can offer.

Summer is a time for children to relax and enjoy their break from school, but it's also crucial to maintain their academic growth. Parents can play a vital role in supporting their elementary child's educational development during the summer months. Studies have shown that students who take the summer off lose up to 3 months of the learning that they gained the previous school year. Those who continue to be engaged in learning grow an additional month during the summer. This is a gap of 4 months between those who continue to grow their brains and those who do not.

To keep your young scholar growing, encourage reading by creating a cozy reading nook at home and visiting the local library regularly. Engage in educational activities such as puzzles, board games, or science experiments that promote critical thinking and problem-solving skills. Scholars will continue to have access to Lexia (for literacy) and Dreambox (for math) throughout the summer through the Clever portal on our website. Both of these programs adapt to the learning needs of your child. They are a great way to help fill in learning gaps that your scholar may have.

You can explore the outdoors together and turn nature walks into learning adventures by discussing plants, animals, and the environment. Consider enrolling your child in summer camps or programs that focus on educational enrichment.

Finally, foster a love for learning by providing opportunities for your child to pursue their interests and hobbies.

By nurturing their curiosity and creating a stimulating learning environment, you can help your child(ren) continue to grow academically throughout the summer.

What Can Families Do to Help Their Child Become College and Career Ready?

Help your child become a reader by reading to your child every day or having him/her read to you. When your child is old enough to read independently, expect twenty to thirty minutes of daily reading. Support your child's reading habit by talking about books, visiting the library, and letting your child see you read, too.



Help your child get to school on time every day. Frequent absence or tardiness has a negative impact on learning and achievement.

Monitor your child's progress in school and keep in contact with his/her teachers. Reinforce learning by reviewing math facts and vocabulary words with your child.

Talk to your child about different careers and the education or training required for various types of jobs. For example, during a visit to the pediatrician, point out different career opportunities: doctor, nurse, medical secretary, or lab technician. If possible, take your child to visit your place of employment.

Cultivate your child's natural curiosity by exploring museums, zoos, airports, planetariums, and battlefields. The classroom isn't the only place where learning happens.
