Pages 22 and 23 of this book explain Germany's plan to attack France, should war break out between Germany, France and Russia. France and Russia were allies, sworn to defend each other should any country declare war on them. Germany sits between France and Russia and was concerned about defending herself on both the French and Russian borders at the same time. General Alfred von Schlieffen, developed a plan where Germany would attack France very quickly, knock out her defenses so that she could then turn all German military resources on Russia. This plan was developed in 1905, ten years before World War I actually broke out. This plan shows that Germany was preparing for a war, long before World War I.

This chart from a website shows the military expenditures of Great Britain, Germany, France, Russia, Italy, United States, and Japan from 1908 to 1913. It is easy to see that all of the countries visibly increased military spending. British expenditures went from \$286.7m to \$374.2m and German expenditures increased from \$286.7m to \$463.6m.
