Cultivate a Sense of Wonder

Curiosity is a sense of wonder and openness about the future. It comes partly from the brain wanting to understand or make order out of something that doesn't make sense. If you have a young child at home, you know that they see the world through the lens of curiosity. They have lots of questions. Curiosity is associated with the release and flow of dopamine and serotonin in the brain, generating a sense of pleasure. Curious brains are also better at learning. Here are some ideas to encourage and help your child maintain a sense curiosity and wonder:

- Be curious with them! Respond to questions with questions of your own.
- Enjoy the process of discovery. Guide them to help figure out answers to their questions themselves.
 GUIDE.
- Share your sense of wonder. Ask lots and lots of questions using "what" and "how".
- Help your children learn how to figure things out. Help them find out answers. Visit a library or jump online.
- Model curiosity. Let them hear you are wondering about something.
- Make reading interactive: Stop in the middle of stories and ask questions. Change the characters names and modify their experiences.

Caring Corner



This month's purposeful people's trait of focus is **Honesty**. Honesty is when we are living truthfully in our words, actions, and thoughts. Not only are we speaking the truth, but we are thinking and acting in ways which are dependable, caring, and genuine. Here's an activity you can do with your family to work on incorporating more honesty into your lives: Everyone has something that gets under their skin – especially in the home environment. Instead of letting someone's actions bother you, try to catch yourself this week and address it by being honest when right it happens. Make sure you use a kind approach and "I feel" statements when talking about others.

Counselor's Corner

During the month of January, classroom counselor lessons are focusing on what it means to CHOOSE TO BE A FRIEND at Stevens Elementary! We want Stevens to be a safe place for all students. I want to share one of the activities taught in the primary grades that you might want to talk about as a family. The folds and creases in the paper doll represent unkind words and actions toward others. This lesson will be referred to throughout the year and has a very positive impact on behavior.

During our lesson and discussion about friendship, each student received a paper doll. Children shared things that a person might say that could be hurtful to someone. With each response, the paper doll was folded and eventually the paper doll was crumpled. The children learned that each time they say something hurtful to someone, they are putting little folds and creases in that person.

Next, we shared things that they might say to someone to make that person feel good. With each response, one of the creases in the paper doll was unfolded. Eventually, all of the creases and folds were pressed out (all of the "hurts") except, of course, for the fact that the paper doll was still creased.

We talked about how when someone says unkind words, it hurts us. Once you say hurtful things, you can't take them back. Saying "sorry" or "I was just kidding", doesn't take the sting of those words away. Long after you have forgotten what you've said, the person you talked to in an unkind way, will remember it. You can't take it back, just like you can't take all the creases and folds out of the paper doll.
