This month in purposeful people we are talking about the social-emotional skill of Empathy. Empathy is the ability to understand and connect to the feelings of another person. Empathy is a crucial and powerful skill for developing connections within the community and in our personal relationships. Through empathy we become aware of knowing how we feel (and having language to describe those feelings!), understanding what others are feeling, and listening to others well so that we can connect in more meaningful ways. This month, challenge yourself to check in on a family member or neighbor who you don't typically get to spend much time with. Ask them how they're doing, what's going well, and/or what they're struggling with. Step into their

story for a moment and practice listening to understand rather than to respond. See how Empathy feels as you simply connect with care.

Counselor's Corner

Often, I have parents coming to me asking for parenting help. Many feel out of control as parents, and feel that their children have far too much control. They want to know how they can be in control of their children. In reality, regaining control as a parent means developing control over themselves and how they respond to their child.

In each month's Counselor Corner, I will be sharing some valuable **Parenting Rules of Thumb** that I teach in CPRT (Child Parent Relationship Training) classes at Stevens.

The first Rule of Thumb is: **Be a thermostat, not a thermometer, in your child's life.** What is the difference between a thermometer and a thermostat? Thermometers simply react to the temperature: the temperature goes up, the thermometer goes up - it doesn't do anything to regulate or help the situation (room temperature). On the other hand, thermostats respond to the slightest change in temperature, taking immediate action to respond in a way to help the situation (room temperature). Thermostats create an environment that is more comfortable and pleasant.

Respond (reflect) rather than react. Your child's feelings are not your feelings. When your child's feelings and behavior escalate, you can respond in a helpful way, rather than simply reacting and allowing your feelings and behavior to escalate, too. In-control parents are like thermostats in their child's life. Out-of-control parents are like thermometers. They only react to what is there.


