#### **Students of the Month**

The Shaw Student of the Month program is the foundation of our VIP program. Student of the Month is built around Character Strong traits and Summit Learning habits. Shaw staff celebrate and recognize students each month who show growth and model these traits and habits.

#### **8-Essential Character Traits**

Character Strong is a robust middle school curriculum, created around 8-Essential Character traits, creates experiences tying together social-emotional learning, character development, and community building into our advisory experience. Students tell us that the lessons are engaging, relevant, and support a school culture where students can set and accomplish goals that lead to readiness for high school success as young adults.

These traits are: Kindness, Commitment, Forgiveness, Patience, Respect, Honesty, Humility, Selflessness

#### **16-Habits of Success**

Summit Learning integrates decades of the most promising research on socialemotional learning in an aligned and comprehensive manner. 16-Habits of Success include the development of skills in five categories:

- 1. Healthy Development (Attachment, Stress Management, Self-Regulation)
- 2. **School Readiness** (Self-Awareness, Social Awareness/Relationship Skills, Executive Function)

Our students have gone through many challenges in the last year and a half due to COVID. It has been difficult for many to go through remote learning and transition back to full-time in-person school. Our students are showing the stress of this challenge.

One of the ways that we meet this need is by the use of CharacterStrong curriculum in our advisory classes. Char-

acterStrong is focused on fostering the Whole Child with vertically-aligned lessons that teach SEL and character, side-by-side. These lessons teach the pillars of character such as:

- **SEL Competencies:** Self-Awareness, Self-Management, Social Awareness, Relationship Skills, Responsible Decision -Making


## **Teaming at Shaw**

We are enjoying our beautiful new school and neighborhood classrooms (all content classrooms are adjacent to each other). Shaw continues to implement teaching teams to provide instruction for students in the four core content areas – English, math, science, and social studies. Each team has six teachers and teachers share a common set of students and a common planning period, an approach that allows for greater communication about student needs. Teachers can share what they learn about individual students and leverage that information to build stronger relationships with students, determine appropriate and effective curricula, and address different study skills and learning techniques. We are looking forward to having 6<sup>th</sup> graders join us in their new neighborhood for 2022-23 school year.

We know students do not all learn at the same rate, do not all have the same goals and interests, and that periods of equal length are not appropriate for all learning situations. Teaching teams have the flexibility to adjust the daily schedule based on how it will best achieve learning goals for students. For example, two teachers may team up during the same or adjacent periods to integrate curriculum or facilitate a longer science lab.

We also know that middle school students benefit from consistent routines, and our teaching teams have developed procedures and expectations that are implemented in every class. Students can feel safe to focus on learning because they know things will not change with every teacher or class period. They know how content is progressing, how they fit in to the group, and what is expected of them. When the learning environment is consistent across content areas, students are more likely to thrive and experience personal and academic growth.

The Shaw mission and vision statements establish our intent to prepare students for academic and social successes in high school and beyond by providing them with a safe, responsible, and respectful learning environment. Teaching teams are one of the models we are utilizing to fulfill our mission and achieve our vision.

## **North Parking Lot Open!**

We are pleased to share that the north parking lot is now open and available for use. This parking lot provides a designated loop for student pick up and drop off as well as parking for the Hillyard Library and Shaw guests. You can access the parking lot by driving south on Cook street and turning left into the lot. After your student has exited your vehicle, you will exit the lot by turning right on Cook street. There is a student entry for before school, beginning at 8:50am in this lot next to the gym. This will also be the entry point for parents to use to cheer on their Vikings at sporting events. The south parking lot, closest to Empire, is designated for staff parking and has limited spots available. Please help us by using the beautiful new parking lot and loop on the north end of the building.

Cook street is no longer a thoroughfare for traffic. It has been redesigned to be pedestrian friendly in an effort to support families as they cross the street to access resources found at the Community Center. The NECC is a valuable part of our Hillyard Community Campus. Thank you for your patience throughout this construction process.

## **School Culture & Strong Relationships**

High achieving schools are predicated on strong relationships. Shaw uses MTSS (Multi-Tiered System of Supports) as a set of ideas and tools to support academic and social student growth by establishing and maintaining positive school culture. MTSS addresses the needs of all students through a multi-tiered intervention system, which creates a positive school environment for both teaching and learning. This system intertwines with a focus on restorative discipline which allows students to repair any harm they may have done to learning community. The Shaw school culture expects students to focus on three things: Students are asked to be safe, responsible and respectful. When students violate any one of these norms, they are

expected to restore/repair the damage that was done to the other members of our learning community. Such strategies employed are students removing themselves from class for a short time to reflect and write down how they caused harm and what they can do to repair the harm. Some students will be referred to a success coach, counselor, case manager or other significant caring adults in the Shaw community to process how to restore relationships harmed by unsafe, disrespectful or irresponsible behaviors. Shaw also has a well-established support team that meets regularly to discuss and problem solve how students can restore violations of the school norms. Parents are asked to partner with staff and their student to restore any harm done to the learning community.

## Welcome to Shaw!

In the fall of 2022, next fall, we will welcome new 7<sup>th</sup> graders to Shaw Middle School and for the first time, we welcome a class of new 6<sup>th</sup> graders as well. We look forward to inviting both 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders and their teachers to experience the Shaw neighborhoods and meet the staff. We will also plan visits for our parents to see the incredible learning spaces we offer, meet staff, and ask questions. We anticipate visitations during the second semester of this school year. See below for the principals that guided the design of our new building and neighborhoods.

### **Core Academic Principles**

- Prioritize grouping 6th grade students together for core classes with a limited number of teachers serving each group.
- Develop student-centered schedules that prioritize proximity between classrooms, minimizes the number of transitions, and supports teacher collaboration.
- Support accelerated course options, classroom differentiation, and additional minutes for literacy and math interventions.
- Emphasize classroom experiences that are active, engaging, rigorous, and promote project-based learning opportunities.

## **Elective Offerings Principles**

- Use school-day and after-school extended learning opportunities to support student access to both elective experiences and academic interventions.
- Provide course offerings that reflect a wide variety of elective experiences and are aligned to high school opportunities.
- Focus elective course curriculum design on attributes of healthy lifestyles, college awareness, and career exploration.

## **School Culture & Environment Principles**

- Provide ongoing classroom and school experiences that promote community building, engagement, developmental needs,
- diversity, civic engagement, and a sense of belonging. Support student success by using consistent and engaging structures to teach expectations and encourage positive
- inclusive, social, and academic behaviors Offer a variety of opportunities in 5th grade and during 6th grade to help students transition and adjust to middle school
- Encourage parent engagement by providing a wide range of activities for parents to learn about and participate in their student's middle school experience
- Emphasize social emotional learning and whole-child supports through counseling, wellness services, community partnerships, and staff training specific to the developmental characteristics of middle school students.

# **Activities & Athletics Principles**

- Offer activities that promote community, leadership, and participation among diverse populations.
- Ensure equitable access by utilizing community partnerships and school support structures to address factors such as transportation, medical assistance, supplies and materials, and equipment.
- Foster activity participation that supports social emotional learning and physical development through an emphasis on teamwork, self-esteem, and grit.
- Promote atmosphere and programming that encourages and welcomes all students to participate in a wide variety of inclusive traditional and nontraditional activities.
